# 1 Introduction

In Report 1 of 2025<sup>1</sup> I wrote that I was not able to report on the outcomes of some audits that were not completed at the time.

This report provides the audit outcomes for the South Australian First Nations Voice to Parliament entities, as their audits are now complete.

I had also intended to include the audit outcomes for the three reporting entities that make up the South Australian Legislature and for the Department for Environment and Water co-management board audits but, as explained in sections 3 and 4, I am not able to as these audits are not complete.

## 2 South Australian First Nations Voice entities

### Functional responsibility

South Australian First Nations Voice entities are established under the *First Nations Voice Act 2023*:

- State First Nations Voice
- Local First Nations Voice (Central)
- Local First Nations Voice (Far North)
- Local First Nations Voice (Flinders and Upper North)
- Local First Nations Voice (Riverland and South East)
- Local First Nations Voice (West and West Coast)
- Local First Nations Voice (Yorke and Mid-North).

The South Australian First Nations Voice to Parliament (First Nations Voice) comprises the State Voice entity and the six Local Voice entities. It is a representative, elected body created under legislation for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. As an advisory body, it does not have veto or decision-making powers in the South Australian Parliament.

Through the First Nations Voice, First Nations people can have their say at the highest levels of decision-making in South Australia on matters, policies and laws, and practices that affect them. This provides an opportunity for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to raise community priorities in a public, transparent and accountable way.

First Nations Voice entities were established on 2 April 2024, when all members received confirmation of their successful nomination to the First Nations Voice. They have been treated as entities for financial reporting purposes from this date.

The First Nations Voice is supported by the First Nations Voice Secretariat, which is in the Attorney-General's Department.

#### Interpretation and analysis of financial information

The First Nations Voice entities receive income from the SA Government that totalled \$360,000 in 2023-24.

Total expenses of \$345,000 comprise:

- \$242,000 in supplies and services, mostly relating to information technology charges
- \$103,000 in member remuneration and related expenses.

### 3 Department for Environment and Water co-management boards

There are nine co-management boards established for parks managed by the Department for Environment and Water. I have previously audited and reported on the Mamungari Conservation Park Co-management Board. I have not yet reported on:

- Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park Co-management Board
- Gawler Ranges Parks Co-management Board
- Ikara-Flinders Ranges National Park Co-management Board

- Kaņku-Breakaways Conservation Park Co-management Board
- Ngaut Ngaut Conservation Park Co-management Board
- Vulkathunha-Gammon Ranges National Park Co-management Board
- Witjira National Park Co-management Board
- Yumbarra Conservation Park Co-management Board.

The Department for Environment and Water is working through a process to prepare separate financial statements for these Boards for the first time, and therefore at the time of this report their audits have not commenced.

Once finalised financial statements for the Boards are provided to me, and my staff have completed the significant audit work required for reporting on agencies in my annual report for the year ended 30 June 2025, we will commence the audit process for the Boards.

I will report on the outcomes of these audits through our regular scheduled reporting once they are completed.

## 4 South Australian Legislature entities

The Legislature was still working to finalise its financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024 at the time of this report. The delay is due to The Legislature revisiting its financial reporting requirements. Once it has resolved the remaining matters delaying the preparation of the financial statements, and my staff have completed the significant audit work required for reporting on agencies in my annual report for the year ended 30 June 2025, we will conduct the financial statement audit of The Legislature.

I will report on the outcome of the audit through our regular scheduled reporting once it is completed.
